

A Recap of our Annual Congregational Meeting

We had our annual meeting on Sunday, January 28, with 43 people in attendance. We reviewed the 2023 financials, highlighted a lower-than-expected income, but also a lower-than-expected total expenses. This meant we ended the year with a \$3,075 deficit. As we then leaned into the 2024 budget that was formally adopted, we noted a \$10,000 anticipated drop in member giving as well as

utilizing less in dedicated funds to supplement our income. There was a Board commitment to provide for three percent increases for staff. Meeting this would require \$10,000 in additional income and still leave us about

\$9,155 in the red (behind) for the budget - \$346,233 budgeted income vs \$355,388 budgeted expenses. A decision was made to have a one time 'Ministry Support 2024' invitation for extra congregational giving – a letter was included in all year-end giving statements. (See update on page three.)



We heard more about what would be needed if we were to try hosting a charter school and spoke about options, we do have in regards to the cell tower. We agreed that if there is action to be taken on school renovations or cell tower options, there will be another congregational meeting for information and applicable votes.

We were glad to welcome Doreen Winter to a one-year term on the Church Board, and also have Beth Renfors and Carmen Snaza be reelected to one-year terms on the Board. Thanks went out to so many people who help make meaningful ministry and compassionate care a deep part of the fabric of Our Redeemer.

Lent - Wednesday Services & Meals

What a wonderful season Lent is in the life of the church and the life of individual believers. These six weeks leading up to Easter have historically been a time of extra introspection, a fuller time of devotion, a deeper time of disciplines, and a wide sense of care for the neighbor. We hope that can be the case again as we walk through Lent this year.



We begin with **Ash Wednesday** worship on **February 14, at 7:00 p. m**. But if you come at **6:15 p.m**., you can join us for a meal tied into our Community Sharing program – special tables will be set up and you will see the end of the night in full activity while enjoying some good fellowship over a meal. This food gathering will take place each Wednesday at 6:15 p.m. through the end of March. A free will offering will be received to support Community Sharing. Worship time will be at **6:45 p.m.** on these other Lenten Wednesdays.

Part of what we will be reminded of at the start of Lent is trying to find a good discipline to take on to help your spiritual life. It might be utilizing devotions or faith-based reading. It might be taking more time for prayer. You might choose to be more generous with financial gifts to organizations. You might choose to be a part of a Bible study. Often Lent is a time when people choose to give up something (that too can be a spiritual discipline) it is better lived by taking something else on. Ponder what that might mean for you.

Two resources to help with your Lent this year will be a devotion booklet put out by 'A Sanctified Art' that will bring scripture, reflections, art, questions, and prayers for your use – we have used a similar devotion the past two years with great response. The other resource is a calendar-based activity packet from the EastSide Collaboration (ESCo) that leads one to doing acts of special care while alternating taking time for guided reading and reflection. Both of these resources can be found on the Welcome Desk, or call the office if you would like us to send you one or both.

Wandering Heart—Figuring out faith with Peter

During our Sunday worship we are going to be focusing on the life and faith of one of Jesus most famous disciples – Peter. In Peter we find a person who is both steadfast and unsteady, a dear friend and a betrayer, a follower and a wanderer. In Peter we often see ourselves, and my following his journey it will no doubt speak to us about our own journey of faith. Come let this Lent be a time to foster our constant journey and steadfast pursuit of following Christ.

Ministry Support 2024-Update

What a generous community! We wanted to share the good news that already we have heard back from everyone on the Board and another 12 people who made a gift/commitment to the 'Ministry Support 2024' appeal to help us meet our budget needs for this year. At the January 31 Annual Meeting, we approved a 2024 budget that required raising \$10,000 in extra gifts from the congregation. And that was going to still leave us with a \$9,000 shortfall. But in these early weeks of this special request, we have already raised \$25,000. That helps us meet our budget and will not require utilizing other dedicated funds we had been planning to use. Any additional gifts to this appeal will help lead us to an even stronger financial base for this year. February is Black History Month—What does Black History Month mean to you?

In honor of Black History Month, ELCA Racial Justice Ministries invited Seminarian Clair Minson to share some thoughts about this topic with our readers. (copied with permission from Living Lutheran, ELCA)

What began as "Negro History Week" in 1926 — created by historian Dr. Carter G. Woodson out of his concern that young African Americans lacked an education about their own heritage and ancestors — has since expanded to what we now know and observe as "Black History Month." Woodson, a life-long educator, understood the power of knowing one's history and one's ancestral heritage. Knowing that you are part of a long legacy of people who have the capacity to create whole societies can ground you in the belief that you too can do anything. Not knowing this history can become a seeding ground for internalized oppression. As Nikole Hannah-Jones writes in her book *The 1619 Project: A New Origin Story*, "The vision of the past I absorbed from school textbooks, television, and the local history museum depicted a world, perhaps a wishful one, where Black people did not really exist. This history rendered Black Americans, Black people on all the earth, inconsequential at best, invisible at worst." I suspect that this erasure of Black his- and her-

story is what Woodson was confronting through the development of Negro History Week.

As people of faith, steeped in the tradition of remembering and honoring our ancestors, we know the power of hearing, repeating and internalizing the miraculous stories of Moses, Joshua, Mary and Paul. Despite thousands of years of separation, we rely on these stories to help us cling to our faith and to a God who can at times feel very distant, despite always being with us. Understanding this, we perhaps also understand that recalling the stories of our Black ancestors is equally as powerful and necessary. In preparation for this blog, I sat with the question "What does Black History Month mean to me?" and after some time an answer surfaced. To me, Black History Month is not just an obligatory nod to African American people; it's a reminder of the strength and resilience of a people who, despite being erased from history and relegated to the margins of society, continue to contribute to the flourishing of our society. It's a reminder of who we are and whose we are. It's a reminder from "whence we came" and a vision for where we can go. It's a clarion call to those who feel lost and need a reminder that their stories and their lives matter.

Black History Month is an opportunity for us as Christians to live into our call to be countercultural and share histories that many in society want to censure. It is an opportunity to live into the commitments we have made as a denomination to honor, protect and value the lives of people of African descent. I ask you, as people of faith, steeped in the tradition of remembering and honoring our ancestors, the same question: What does Black History Month mean to you?

Confirmation

Our faith journeys are always a life-long experience. It is really nice when some of that foundation gets laid in our early years to hear and learn Biblical stories and to be woven into a community. This

very experience is happening right now in the Confirmation program we have at Our Redeemer. In conjunction with Cross Lutheran, we gather our middle school youth together multiple times a month for class time (focusing on Lutheran foundations) as well as monthly larger social and learning activities in partnership with five other Saint Paul area Lutheran congregations. Add in to this a cabin retreat we had in October and a half dozen nights of volunteering at Community Sharing, and this is a great place/time to help form the faith and form some friendships.



To give you a taste of recent activity, our teaching has focused on the themes of Justification by Faith, The Cross, Saint and Sinner, Grace, The Neighbor and upcoming will be on Holy Week, Vocation,

The Devil, and Doubt. And in our Deep Dive (with 8 local churches) last month, we visited Lutheran Social Services and through various stations learned much more about *Homelessness* for youth, *Adoption, Refugee* resettlement, and the work of *Advocacy*. In February we will be enjoying an afternoon of indoor rock climbing (connected with a theme of trusting in God) and in March there is a special music concert planned.



This is one more way Our Redeemer is living into our mission of *Transforming Lives and Building Community by Loving God and serving others*. Thanks to the youth who are attending and the adults who are supporting this good activity.

The Lenten Challenge

Join the EastSide Collaborative Lutheran churches (Arlington Hills, Grace, Gustavus Adolphus and Our Redeemer) for another great Lenten challenge—similar to last year! It will consist of the 40 days of Lent, which begins on Ash Wednesday, February 14, and ends on the Saturday (March 30) before Easter Sunday, March 31. During Lent, many people choose to give up something or do something



additional to reflect on God's blessings in our lives. We are challenging you to do both! Throughout the 40 days, we will give you suggestions or guidance such as reading a scripture, praying for a specific need, calling a friend or shut-in, listening to a hymn, walking around your neighborhood (or within your building complex), giving up an item from your home to give to someone in need, etc. Coming soon, we will make available a "Challenge" guide along with a paper bag for your donations to be given to the Alley Shoppe at Arlington Hills that has provided clothing and household goods to families in need since 1970.

[Did you know that the 40 days of Lent do not include Sundays? Here's some history: Since all Sundays—and not simply Easter Sunday—were days to celebrate Christ's Resurrection, Christians were forbidden to fast and do other forms of penance on those days. Therefore, when the Church expanded the period of fasting and prayer in preparation for Easter from a few days to 40 days (to mirror Christ's fasting in the desert, before He began His public ministry), Sundays could not be included in the count. Therefore, in order for Lent to include 40 days on which fasting could occur, it had to be expanded to six full weeks (with six days of fasting in each week) plus four extra days—Ash Wednesday and the Thursday, Friday, and Saturday that follow it.]
