Hello, Our Redeemer! My name is Jake Summerville and I am your new deacon intern! I'll be serving for the next six months or so, helping out with all kinds of ministries around this church and at Arlington Hills Lutheran. I am from Coon Rapids, Minnesota, and was born and raised in the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA). I graduated from Carthage College with a degree in Communication and Public Relations, but felt a strong call to ministry which led me to five years as the Director of High School Ministry at Bethel Lutheran Church in Hudson, Wisconsin. This internship is the last requirement I have to complete my degree at Luther Seminary with the intent to be ordained as a deacon shortly after. I am thrilled to be a part of all of the great ministries Our Redeemer has to offer, and to become more involved with the East Side of Saint Paul.

Our Redeemer is doing some essential work in the neighborhood, which has made it a great fit for my call to diaconal ministry. Deacons are a relatively new thing for the ELCA, and many people wonder what exactly it is that deacons do in the church. The short answer is just about anything! The long answer is that deacons are meant to be the link between the church and the world, however that might look. Some deacons invest themselves into chaplaincy, tending to the spiritual care of those in need. Others run non-

Synod, or specialize in music and provide worship support to many churches. Still others work for organizations like Lutheran Social Services or even for synod or churchwide offices. The role of a deacon is broad, but in all of these cases they are ambassadors for Christ in spaces both in and out of church walls.

It is my hope that in my journey in diaconal ministry, I can specialize in youth advocacy, serving children and teenagers who are at risk. This kind of servant-centered, relational ministry is exactly the kind of thing the ELCA would select a deacon for. If you have any questions about

diaconal ministry or my personal call to the diaconate, I would be more than happy to chat! Feel free to ask me anything, and while you're at it, ask me about my cat! Thank you for bringing me into this vibrant community, and I can't wait to see what good work we can do together.

The Season of Lent

During March, we continue with the beautiful season of Lent leading up to Easter, which is a time when we generally engage in a time of extra introspection, a fuller time of devotion, a deeper time of disciplines, and a wide sense of care for our neighbors and community.

During our Sunday worship services, we have been focusing on the life and faith of one of Jesus most famous disciples – Peter. In Peter we find a person who is both steadfast and unsteady, a dear friend and a betrayer, a follower and a wanderer. In Peter we often see ourselves, and by following his journey, it speaks to us about our own journey of faith.

We have been using two resources during Lent. One is a devotion booklet by 'A Sanctified Art' entitled, "Wandering Heart—Figuring out faith with Peter" that consists of scripture, reflections, art, questions, and prayers for your use. The other resource is a calendar-based activity packet from the EastSide Collaboration (ESCo) that leads one to doing acts of special care while alternating taking time for guided reading and reflection, as well as giving up items to be donated. The Lenten Challenge

We hope you are enjoying The Lenten Challenge sponsored by the EastSide Collaborative Lutheran churches (Arlington Hills, Grace, Gustavus Adolphus and Our Redeemer) that consisted of the 40 days of Lent, and will end on the Saturday (March 30) before Easter Sunday (March 31). During Lent, many people choose to give up



something or do something additional to reflect on God's blessings in our lives. Both are being done in this challenge. The suggestions consist of reading a scripture, praying for a specific need, calling a friend or shut-in, listening to a hymn, walking around your neighborhood (or within your building complex), giving up an item from your home to give to someone in need, etc. Bring your donations to church, which will be given to the Alley Shoppe at Arlington Hills each week. The Alley Shoppe has provided clothing and household goods to families in need since 1970.

We have new front doors!

We have our new, long-time awaiting front doors, which include an accessible electronic door mechanism. A special thanks to Randy Koza and a good group of other guys who have been working on this much needed improvement to our building! If you have a key, you will be able to use it for the new door. Please note that the door knob installed is not the correct one and until it is replaced, we want to take extra precautions that the door actually gets locked. The door knob only allows you to lock the door from the outside with a key. Therefore, if you are the last person leaving through the front door, please make sure you use your key to lock the door from the outside. If you don't have a key, lock the front door by turning the lock lever from the inside and then leave through one of the other building doors that lock automatically.

Planned Building Power Outage

On Monday. March 18, our Federal Pacific Lighting panel in the boiler room will be replaced, which will cause power outages in various parts of building. In addition to lights, it most likely will involve our baseboard heating system, copier/printer, and possibly the phone system.
